

# Bailey's 41 lifts Utah

Thurl Bailey scored a career-high 41 points to lift Utah to a 116-115 victory Monday over Denver in National Basketball Association play.

Michael Adams led Denver, hitting five three-point shots.

Detroit stopped Sacramento, 109-97. Adrian Dantley scored 19 points to move past George Gervin into 13th place on the NBA's all-time scoring list with 20,715 as Detroit won a club-record 16th straight home game.

Mark Jackson scored 15 of his 17 points and Bill Cartwright 13 of his 17 in the second half as New York overcame a 15-point deficit to beat Cleveland, 104-102.

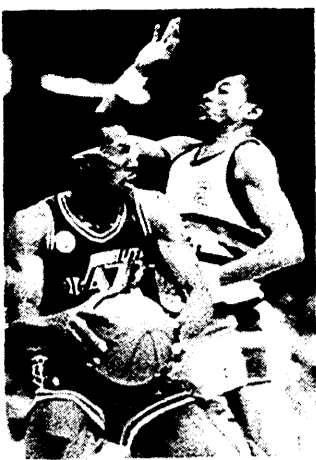
The Knicks were leading 102-100 when Cleveland's Ron Harper missed a shot with eight seconds remaining. Jackson rebounded, was fouled and made both free throws with two seconds left.

Patrick Ewing led New York with 19 points.

Larry Nance led the Cavs with 24 points.

Jeff Malone had 36 points and Moses Malone 32 as Washington handed San Antonio, 112-106. Walter Berry led the Spurs with 22 points.

Dallas tripped Golden State, 121-101. Mark Aguirre scored 20 points to lead seven Dallas players in double-figures as the Mavericks won for the 14th time in their last

17 games. Sam Perkins and Roy Tarpley, who also had 16 rebounds, added 18 points each.

Byron Scott scored 21 points and Mychal Thompson added 10 of his 16 points in the fourth quarter as the Los Angeles Lakers defeated New Jersey, 115-105. The victory was the Lakers' 50th of the season, the ninth straight year they have reached that figure.

The Lakers played without Magic Johnson, who missed his second complete game with a groin injury. But Michael Cooper returned to the lineup after missing 12 games with a sprained left ankle.

Paul Elser, 6-8, led Harris-Lake Park with 24 points and 18 rebounds, but he was limited to eight points in the second half by 6-foot Paul Hinners.

Wellsburg-Steamboat Rock (23-0) blitzed Boone United 70-41. The Warriors opened with a 14-0 spree, then went on an 18-1 tear to start the third quarter. That made it 50-17 with 1:54 left in the period.

Dustin Blythe led the winners with 18 points and Scott Starr scored 17. Brian Farrell led

United (18-4) with 13 points. The Comets didn't get their first basket until the final minute of the first quarter and shot only 27.9 percent from the field.

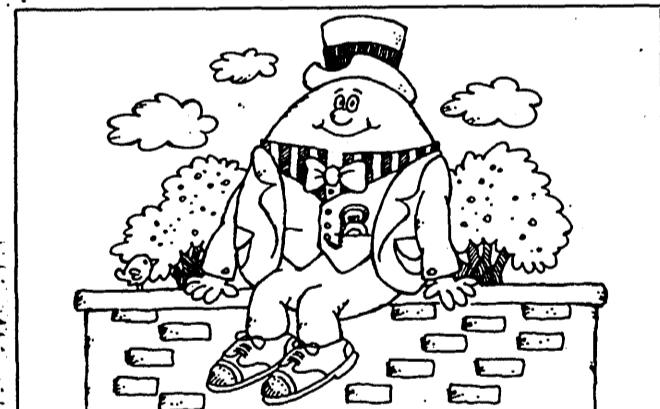

It's the first state trip for the Falcons since 1979, while St. Edmond is returning to state for the first time since 1981.

"It's going to be an exciting week," Collison said. "We're looking forward to it, and I'm sure St. Albert is too."

Kavars said, "This is what these kids have been working for since practice started in November. It's quite a reward. We're looking forward to playing at state."

IN ADDITION to the statistical similarities, Collison said, the Falcons and Gaels are alike in how they reached the state tournament.

"First of all, we play in one of the toughest conferences around, I think," Collison said. The Gaels were champions of the Midwest Conference, of which Audubon, which the Falcons conquered in the substate round, is a member.

"Two of our teams were in the Final Four last year," he added, referring to Perry and Audubon.

"I think it's developing into a very tough conference. And I know St. Albert plays in a tough conference (Nebraska Centennial) as well. If you're good enough to come out of that on top, you're doing something right."

Going up twice this season against Perry, Audubon and always-scrappy Carroll has made

the Gaels tough at Tournament Time, Collison said.

Furthermore, he added, St. Edmond has played all four of its post-season games on the road.

"That helped, because we had to win in some tough places. You get used to doing whatever it takes to win," Collison said. "St. Albert's the same way. They had to beat Red Oak down at their place (in the district semifinals). That was a big win for them."

ONE FACTOR possibly worth watching is how well the two teams adjust to playing so early in the day, in comparison to their normal tipoff times of about 8 p.m.

Collison said, "With our district and substate games, the hardest thing was waiting all day to play. Playing at noon won't be so bad. We'll be able to get up and play right away instead of having to sit around all day and think about it."

Kavars added, "I think you could play at seven in the morning and these kids would be ready to go. I don't think it'll be that big a factor."

Keeping one's mind on the task at hand, rather than getting caught up in the tournament panorama, will be all-important to the players, Kavars added.

"OBVIOUSLY, THE KIDS are going to be sky-high... You go into Vets Auditorium, and there's an electricity there," the veteran Falcons coach said. "It's that time of the year, it's Tournament Time. With all the players, fans and news media, everyone's pumped up for the ballgame. It's something you get to experience maybe once or twice in your lifetime."

"You don't want to get caught up in the excitement of the moment. You don't want to get so excited that you lose sight of the job you've got to do," Kavars added.
