Goodenbour, a second team all-stater last year, averaged 17.3 points, 6.9 assists and 5 rebounds a game. She ranked second in the state in assists, fifth in interceptions and eighth in free throw percentage at the end of regular season play.

She's been a three-year starter for the Titanettes and was an all-state choice in volleyball this past fall.

THE OTHER first-team forwards also have impressive credentials.

Waugh is one of the premier players, not only in Iowa, but in the nation. She is a member of the USA TODAY Super 25 High School list and is a Women's Basketball News Service first team high school all-American.

Van Deest put Grundy Center in the state tournament and was named captain of the six player state tournament team. She hit 63 percent of her shots from the field, 80 percent from the free throw line and connected on 56 percent of her three-point attempts. She had a high of 71.

All four guards on the first team have two things in common. First, they are all seniors. Second, they have all been named to a previous all-state team by the Iowa Newspaper Association.

Michel Reichenbacher of Southeast Polk repeated as a first team all-stater. She is all hustle on the court. During the regular season she averaged 5.7 rebounds and 5 interceptions per game on a balanced guard court.

Katie O'Connor of New Hampton also repeated as a first teamer. She averaged 10 rebounds 5 steals and 2 blocked shots per game.

Steph Jacobs of Ventura moved up from last year's second team of all-staters while Lynette Gruis of Sibley-Ocheyedan was on the third unit of the 1986 all-state team.

Jacobs averaged 6.3 rebounds and 4.3 steals on one of the best defensive teams in the state. Over the last three years, Sibley-Ocheyedan was 70-3 and defense carried the Lady Generals. Gruis averaged 5.7 rebounds, 5.8 steals and 1.7 blocked shots this season. She has had more than 100 rebounds and steals in each of the last two seasons.

Coburn hit his first two shots from the field, including a three-point try; Hubbert scored a pair of inside baskets; Nixon hit three times, one a trey; and Dave Tornabane followed in a Ned Greer miss just before the buzzer to put A.L. up at the break, 21-19.

"We knew we deserved to be here," Coburn said. "We just decided to come out and show what we could do."

Greer's putback of a missed Nixon free throw at 5:56 of the second quarter gave the Lynx their biggest lead of the game at 26-21.

But the Cougars responded by outscoring them 14-5 the rest of the stanza, including 8-0 at one point.

"We just had to settle down and do the things that got us here," Zediker said. "We were more patient on offense and put some pressure on at the defensive end of the floor."

IN THE THIRD QUARTER, those who hadn't seen the Lynx play this season probably thought their chances sagged when Nixon was whistled for his fourth personal foul with 4:03 to go.

Nixon had scored five straight points to bring A.L. back to within two points, at 42-40, when he went to the bench.

But the Lynx outscored Kennedy, 9-6 the rest of the frame.

Hubbert sank two free throws; Tornabane scored off an inbound lob pass from Coburn; Milner hit a basket and free throw; and

Coburn hit Rob Goodman for a breakaway layup after Hubbert swatted away Todd Newhouse's close-in try.

A.L. led 49-48 at the break. Milner said, "it was all psychological. When Kevin went out, we all had to come together."

Koch said, "the kids hung together and did a great job. They showed the kind of heart and character they've shown all season."

BUT IN THE final frame, the Cougars forced several key turnovers and quickly capitalized at the other end.

A.L. especially had trouble inboundng the ball following Kennedy scores.

"They were fronting our people pretty good," Coburn said. "It was hard to find anybody wide-open."

Those lapses gave the Cougars enough of an opening to take control. Simpson scored from the lane with 3:22 left to put the Cougars ahead to stay at 59-57. Johnson sank two foul shots a minute later, and Laube scored inside to make it 63-57.

Although Greer made a basket and free throw with 54 seconds remaining to bring the Lynx back to within three points at 67-64, Johnson's two free throws 11 seconds later gave the Cougars what proved to be their winning points.

Zediker said, "A.L. was every bit as tough as I thought they'd be. I thought we did a good job of keeping our poise. Those free throws weren't easy."

# Spartans upset WDM Valley

DES MOINES (AP) — Step aside you long-range gunners from Palmer.

Shane Teagarden is out to steal your thunder.

Teagarden made eight 3-point shots and scored 40 points Wednesday night as unranked Pleasant Valley upset No. 4 West Des Moines Valley 70-66 to reach the semifinals of the Class 3A boys state basketball tournament.

It was the type performance that would have delighted the folks from Palmer, which is seeking its third straight Class A title behind the shooting of Brian Pearson and Troy Skinner.

"He's a 40 percent shooter and probably had one of the finest exhibitions of shooting ever in a state tournament game except maybe for the Palmer kids," a stunned Valley Coach O'Dea said.

"We put four different people on him and it didn't make any difference."

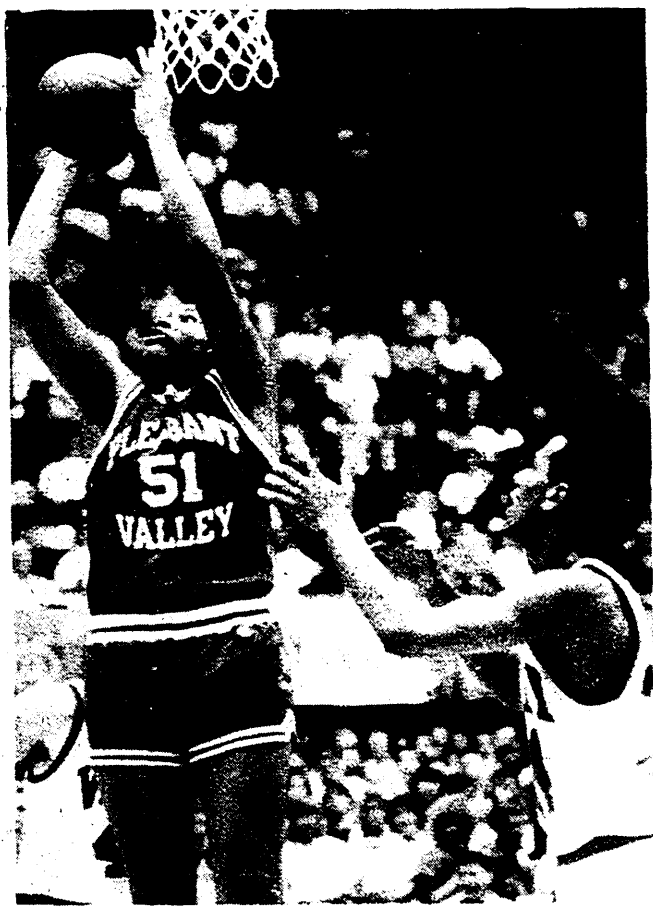
Teagarden's performance was no surprise to Pleasant Valley Coach Ed Merritt, however.

"He's been shooting like that all year," Merritt said. "He's a super player. I felt all year that if not for the best, he's one of the top three to five players in the state. I think he proved it tonight."

The Spartans' next challenge will be No. 1-ranked Fort Dodge, which cruised to a 79-64 victory over Davenport West, one of Pleasant Valley's rivals in the Mississippi Athletic Conference. Pleasant Valley will take a 15-7 record against the 21-1 Dodgers at 3:30 p.m. Friday.

No. 2 Cedar Rapids Kennedy (22-1) will meet unranked Indianola (17-6) in the other semifinal at 1:45 p.m. Kennedy staved off a determined upset bid by lightly regarded Abraham Lincoln, escaping with a 69-67 victory, while Indianola defeated Waverly-Shell Rock 61-48.

away from the outside, 6-3 center Ibn Pitts was hitting some key baskets inside. He finished with 14 points and 10 rebounds in one of his better efforts of the season.

"He transferred in from Detroit and suffered a stress fracture early in the season," Merritt said. "He was out for about a month to five weeks. We felt if he got back by tournament time, he'd be able to help us. He did tonight."

"He's improved tremendously and has been a key factor in our success in the latter part of the year."

Valley, which was second in last year's tournament, rallied from a 10-point deficit early in the fourth quarter to tie the score at 52-all on Chris Heller's 3-pointer with 3:19 left.

But Teagarden came back with a jump shot off a screen and Pitts followed up a Teagarden miss to put Pleasant Valley ahead for keeps, 60-56.

Teagarden then knocked in a pair of 3-pointers 31 seconds apart to keep the Spartans on top. They were critical because Valley's Mike Maharray sank two 3-pointers and Heller made one in the final 2:03, leaving Valley

trailing 68-66 with 18 seconds remaining.

However, Pleasant Valley beat Valley's full-court press and Pitts sailed in for a wide open layup for the final points.

Morgan Wheat led Valley (19-3) with 26 points, Heller scored 12, Mike Dulaney had 11 and Maharray 10. Heller, the Tigers' best outside shooter, didn't score in the first half, which ended with Valley ahead 36-35.

Fort Dodge 79, Davenport West 64 Wade Lookingbill scored 24 points and grabbed 17 rebounds to lead Fort Dodge, which is making its fourth consecutive state tournament appearance and ninth overall.

Jay Goodman added 22 points and Marc Carlson scored 17. Coach Tom Goodman, Jay's father, said his team can play better, but he was still satisfied.

"To play mediocre and win the ballgame is really good. That's super," he said. "Hopefully, we'll bounce back and play a good game against Pleasant Valley."

Fort Dodge raced to a 14-2 lead, led 40-28 at halftime and was ahead by as many as 17 points in the second half. Jon Dietz and Dan Martens led West (14-9) with 18 points each. Steve Howland scored 15 and Derek Sandknop added 12.

Indianola 61, Wav.-Shell Rock 48 This was much more pleasant for Indianola than its previous state tournament appearance, an 86-32 drubbing by Bettendorf in 1986. Jeff Hartung led the Indians with 20 points and 6-8 sophomore Chris Street added 14.

Hartung and fellow guard Eric Green consistently beat their Waverly-Shell Rock counterparts down the floor and frequently set each other up for layups by slapping the ball away on defense. Green finished with eight points.

"Putting pressure on their guards was part of our game plan," Indianola Coach Bert Hanson said. "We didn't do it at all in our district and substitute games. We weren't able to do it. But we thought we could beat Waverly-Shell Rock out there."

In the fourth quarter, Indianola hit Waverly-Shell Rock with an 11-2 run to build the lead to 61-44 with 2:09 remaining and finish off the Go-Hawks.
